On behalf of our Board of Directors, our volunteers, our parents and our youth; I thank you. In just two years we have made tremendous progress in creating a pipeline of black youth civic leaders. Our youth have made great strides in achieving their own goals and have grown passionate in advocating for systemic change for themselves, their families and the broader DC community.

This year:

- ▶ 180 youth participated in our Inaugural Youth Civic Leadership Summit.
- Our Civic Leadership & Engagement programs increased the number of youth served by 50%.
- Our youth and parents partnered with young professionals to serve over 500 households during a 3-day service trip in Flint, Michigan.
- Our youth activated their power by engaging media outlets and elected officials to address issues of disciplinary policies and contaminated water in their schools.

YOUTH CIVIC LEADERSHIP SUMMIT

The Black Swan Academy introduced 180 black middle school youth to seven Civic Leaders at our Inaugural Civic Leadership Summit. The Youth Civic Leadership Summit is a half day experience for high school students to regain a sense of pride, purpose and power. Youth LEARNED from well-known leaders, EXPLORED careers from all sectors through hands on workshops and a mini college/career expo, AIDED in a school-based service project and ultimately DISCOVERED the leader within them.

WE ARE PROUD ABOUT WHO WE ARE AND WHERE WE COME FROM

Youth who participated in our Civic Leadership programming were given opportunities to improve their academic success, build their self confidence, develop as leaders, and explore black history & culture.

- Parents and faculty of youth in our Civic Leadership programming reported improvements in grades, attendance, and confidence. Youth also increased engagement in out-of school extra curricular activities, involvement in leadership opportunities and strengthened their ability to give and receive healthy emotional support.
- Middle School Promotion rate/outcomes: **100%** of students were promoted to the next grade level.
- Students received awards for: Best Attendance, Most improved in Science, Most Improved in Math.
- High School Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP)-100% of students eligible for SYEP participants
- Two students earned an opportunity to study abroad through a competitive program with DCPS
- **80%** participated in additional extra curricular activities

As an organization, BSA also provided additional opportunities for youth and their communities to build their self confidence, develop as leaders, and explore black history & culture:

SATURDAY SCHOOL WITH NATIONAL BLACK UNITED FRONT

African Centered Summer program, educating youth on science, technology, engineering and mathematics, as well as learning about the principles of Kwanzaa.

I AM SHE: SUMMER SERIES FOR BLACK GIRLS

Five week Summer Series dedicated to building up young black women and girls through engaging discussion and activities around intersectionality.

WE HAVE A PURPOSE IN OUR COMMUNITIES



Youth in our Civic Leadership programs led the planning and implementation of 4 high impact service events:

WINTER CLOTHING POP-UP SHOPPE

We marched and served during the MLK Day Parade in SE, DC, helping keep our brothers and sisters warm by distributing **50** coats and hundreds of articles of winter clothing (scarves, hats, jeans and sweaters)

FLINT WATER CRISIS

20 youth and young professionals traveled from DC to Flint, Michigan to serve and stand in solidarity with the residents of Flint impacted by the water crisis. Youth were involved in facilitated discussions with Flint youth, participated in a Community Action meeting, conducted interviews with Flint activists and then distributed over **400** cases of water to residents in Flint's North End.

SOCKS AND LUNCH FOR THOSE EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS AND HUNGER

44 youth and mentors made and distributed **300** lunches and socks to DC residents impacted by poverty and/or homelessness.

ANACOSTIA RIVER WITH ART REACH

60 youth participated in a citywide art project aimed to raise awareness of the environmental concerns facing our local rivers and the ecology of our wetlands at the Anacostia River Festival.

PURPOSE



As an organization, we supported and promoted a myriad of community events led by our partner organizations that addressed the needs of the communities we are in relationship with.

A town hall on Policing: Black Women and Girls: **50** women and girls convened to share stories of their experience with law enforcement and brainstorm solutions to a culture of police violence.

Black Millennials for Flint Community
Action Summit: Dozens of community
members gathered to obtain skills to fight
environmental justices, in particular, lead
exposure, disproportionately impacting
communities of color.

Race and Equity in Education: Over **70** Young professionals and educators gathered to discuss ways to achieve equity in education for students of color.

Voices of Color: A Community Discussion About the Colorism Experience: A night exploring all spectrums of colorism, black beauty, acceptance, self love, and Black empowerment.



POWER

WE HAVE THE INNATE POWER TO IMPACT CHANGE



Youth in our Civic Leadership programs advocated on three issues this school year: Gun Violence, School Disciplinary policies and contaminated water in DC's public schools.

To address these concerns youth and organization leaders:

- Met with Council Members
- Raised awareness of issues to stakeholders
- Engaged Media outlets
- Testified at Public hearings
